


Kelseyville Riviera Town Hall a Success

Including Q&A With Jessica Pyska and Mireya Turner

The Town Hall meeting of the Kelseyville Riviera Community Association (KRCA) was buzzing with Members actively giving their input into the updated draft of the KRCA Strategic Plan. During the meeting on Thursday, January 25th, the Strategic Planning Committee presented an updated draft of the Plan which includes the areas of Governance, Finance, Facilities, Outreach, and Safety. This Committee and the Town Hall was facilitated by members of the KRCA Community, Janine Citron, April Leiferman, and George Bloomfield and office manager, Tina Turner.





After a brief overview of the draft Plan, attendees were invited to participate in any two of the five interactive, topic-specific breakout sessions. Each group facilitator provided an in-depth review of the goals for that topic and recorded Member input. The interaction was lively and positive. Following the breakouts, Member input for each topic was added to the presentation panels, before Members used adhesive dots to indicate their priorities.



The Association was pleased to welcome Supervisor Jessica Pyska and County Community Development Director Mireya Turner to join in the process. Community Members enjoyed a Question and Answer session where the County's Area and General Plans were discussed. Pyska described the process in which roads are targeted for improvement. She also congratulated the Association for its progress on fire safety. Members expressed interest in the County's funding options for a possible County park in the community. Currently, the KRCA does not have a public park or lakefront access for members.

Results of the Community's Strategic Plan review and prioritization exercise showed that Members highly value obtaining a pool, a family-friendly park with a picnic and play areas, lakefront area with water access and marina, dog park(s), a larger clubhouse, waterpark, and security measures such as community patrol or surveillance cameras. Interest in receiving the recently reinstated *The Rivieran* newsletter was also high. Members expressed support of the Association's assertive efforts to obtain and include Community input in the Plan's development. Once finalized in the next few months, the new KRCA Strategic Plan will provide a roadmap for strong leadership development for the Association as well as stable succession planning.



The Strategic Planning Committee will incorporate the questions and results of a 2019 Community Survey, along with input from Friday's Town Hall, to develop and circulate an updated Community Survey to be sent to all Community Members. Fresh data from this final Survey will allow the Committee to hone the Plan before presenting it to the KRCA Board with a recommendation to adopt. When adopted, the new Strategic Plan will provide a clear roadmap for achieving the goals of the Members, and position the Association to bring new and improved assets to the Community, as well as to obtain grants and other financial backing for future Community enhancements.

The following examples highlight some of our recent achievements:

We hired a team of three capable new staff members who demonstrate a high level of competency and responsiveness to the needs of Community Members. Please stop by and meet Tina, Alicia, Emily and Mike.

Like many small businesses in Lake County in the aftermath of COVID, we have reconciled three years of financial records, including financial audits and tax return filings with NO findings or evidence of mishandling KRCA funds.

We achieved recertification of our FireWise status resulting in home insurance savings for many property owners. FireWise status also makes our Association eligible for more grant money to fund wildfire mitigation strategies in our Community.

We created a clean and welcoming atmosphere at the Association office inside and out - organized office space, completed a new picnic area for Member use, installed a lending library, and trimmed vegetation.

We established a dynamic Strategic Planning initiative that will serve as a roadmap for future development of amenities, and make us eligible for grants and other funding opportunities. This plan also promotes efficient and professional business and governance practices for the Association.

We demonstrate continued dedication to improving the structure and facilitation of KRCA Board meetings to encourage efficiency, Member inclusion, and constructive productivity at meetings through Zoom, published agendas, and adherence to the Davis-Stirling and Open Meeting Act.

We revamped the standing committee structures encouraging greater Member involvement in Association operations and activities like the Children's Christmas Festival and wildfire safety activities. And, even more social events and activities are being planned. *Stay Tuned!*

We re-established and improved the KRCA Website and social media presence resulting in more accurate and timely information being made available to Community Members.

We activated *The Rivieran* newsletter publication to keep Members informed of Association activities and important news affecting the safety and well being of KRCA residents. *The Rivieran* also highlights many of our Community's businesses, special events, volunteer opportunities, fun facts and other information.

Subject: What is Zone-0 and Why should I care? 02/01/2024

Hi KRCA Members,

Zone-0 otherwise known as AB 3074 was signed into law by Governor Newsom on 9/29/2020. The purpose of this legislation is to create an ember resistant zone within 5 feet of a structure. A structure for the purpose of an ember-resistant zone shall include any attached deck. As many of you already know, embers generated from a wildfire can travel up to one mile or more under severe windy conditions. These regulatory changes will be required in the entirety of the State Responsibility Area (SRA) classified as Very High Fire Severity Zone. Our community falls within this classification. New construction will have these requirements established as of 1/01/23. The exact specifications of this new regulation for existing homes have not yet been codified. Past fire history and research have proven that clearing combustible material 5 feet around a structure is potentially the single most important thing you can do to protect your home. Zone-0 reduces the potential of ignition of your home from direct flame contact by wind driven embers accumulating at the base of the wall, and when embers ignite vegetation or other combustible materials located close to the structure. The zone also includes the area under attached decks and stair landings. To be most effective, the zone should include a 6 inch vertical space between the ground and the start of the building's exterior siding.

This past weekend I decided to be proactive and I divided and transplanted Bears Breech (acanthus mollis) away from the 0-zone at my residence. I also removed pine bark mulch, which is highly combustible, that I had spread out years ago within a retaining wall at the rear of my house. I plan on replacing the mulch with gravel this spring. It should be noted that there really are no fireproof plants. Any plant will burn when exposed to an extreme wind driven fire. Plant placement is actually more important than what you plant. Select low growing, open structured, less resinous, high moisture content plants like succulents. Some examples are ice plant, jade plant, crassula, California poppy,

South African daisy and sedum. This firewise landscaping requires regular maintenance including pruning, watering, and removal of dead vegetation and organic material.

During the course of doing research for this article, I came across an excellent 8 minute video on the **Sonomavalleyfire.org** home webpage. Once you go to the home page, click on New Regulation – Zone 0 (0-5 ft) Defensible Space. If you scroll down the page you will see the YouTube video titled <u>Ember Resistant Zone</u> within 5 feet of structure and attached decks (0-5ft). Another excellent resource is a 46 page slide show presentation that can be found at <u>bof.fire.ca.gov/media/54flflkr/wkshp-3-valachovic- presentation_ada.pdf</u>

In closing, I would like to reiterate that Zone-0 is not yet codified into law and that it may be a while before that happens. But until then, I would highly encourage KRCA members to be proactive in hardening your homes in Zone-0 before the upcoming fire season, I know I will.


